# Chapter 1: Avaya Workplace Clients and IP Office

Avaya Workplace Client is a unified communications application that works on Windows, Android, macOS and iOS (iPhone and iPad) (see [Operating system support](#) on page 10).

## What is new

### IP Office R11.1.3

For IP Office R11.1.3, IP Office supports the following new features for the Avaya Workplace Client:

- **Internal or Mobile Twinning Selection**

Avaya Workplace Client users can have both **Internal Twinning** and **Mobility Features** configured by the IP Office system administrator. Those users can then select which twinning mode is active using their client's **Incoming Call Features** menu. They can only enable one twinning mode at any time.

- **Simultaneous Device Call Controls**

Avaya Workplace Client users with simultaneous or twinned telephone devices can move and retrieve calls between those devices and their Avaya Workplace Client device.

- When they have answered a call on another device, they can use their Avaya Workplace Client to retrieve that call on the client (**Retrieve Call**).

- When they have answered a call on their Avaya Workplace Client, they can move the call to their other device (**Move Call**).

- **Workplace Client IPv6 Support**

For IP Office R11.1.3.1, mobile Avaya Workplace Client R3.35 users (Android and iOS) can connect using IPv6 through an ASBCE R10.1.2. The ASBCE does the required IPv6 to IPv4 address routing. For further details, refer to the [Deploying Remote IP Office SIP Phones with an ASBCE](#) manual.

### IP Office R11.1.2.4

For IP Office R11.1.2.4, IP Office supports the following new features for the Avaya Workplace Client:

- **46xxspecials.txt File Supported** - IP Office now supports the use of the `46xxspecials.txt` file with Avaya Workplace Client clients. This allows custom settings to be applied to the clients whilst still using the auto-generated `46xxsettings.txt` file for the main IP Office settings.
- **User Self-Avatar** - Previously for the user's self-avatar, Avaya Workplace Client just displayed the user's initials. Now, for user's logged in using Avaya Spaces or SSO, Avaya Workplace Client can use the user's avatar from the Avaya Spaces or SSO account (Gmail, Office365, Salesforce) used to login. Alternatively, it can use their avatar for Microsoft Exchange if using Exchange Web Services (EWS) integration.
- **Auto-Answer** - Avaya Workplace Client users can now enable an **Incoming Call Features** setting to automatically answer calls. When on, all calls (audio, video and group) that would have rung on the client device are auto-answered.

- HTTPS and WebSocket (WSS) ([WebSocket](#))
- WebRTC ([wiki/WebRTC](#))

TLS traffic is used for both HTTPS and WSS, any TLS-inspection should support these protocols or have an exception for Spaces' hosts.

TCP and HTTP tunneling are not supported for Audio and Video.

The following hosts and protocols should be unrestricted for all Avaya Spaces features to work as intended. Whitelisting based on IP address is not recommended since these may change dynamically. In addition, HTTP headers such as Authorization should be left intact.

- The system's **SIP Registrar FQDN** should be set and should be resolvable through DNS back to the system.
- For Avaya Spaces and external Avaya Workplace Client, that resolution must be supported externally.

## IP Office Messaging Server Configuration

Avaya Workplace Client clients can perform their initial registration either direct with the IP Office system or via Avaya Spaces. The selected method affects how instant messaging and presence information can be provided to the Workplace clients.

### Procedure

1. Using either IP Office Manager or IP Office Web Manager, load the system configuration.
2. Select **System > System**.
3. Locate the **Messaging Server** option and select the required setting:

Setting	Description
<b>one-X Portal</b>	The one-X Portal server is used to support instant messaging between IP Office clients including Avaya Workplace Client. The Workplace clients need to register directly to the IP Office system by entering the URL for the 46xxsetting.txt file rather than using features like SSO or email.
<b>Avaya Spaces</b>	Workplace client instant messaging and presence is done via Spaces. It does not include non-Spaces users. Workplace clients can register using any of the methods supported through Spaces.

4. Save the configuration change.

## User Configuration

The processes in this document create a new Avaya Workplace Client user who will use Avaya Workplace Client in standalone mode. That is, a user without an associated extension record.

If you want to configure a user who will use both a desk phone and Avaya Workplace Client in simultaneous mode, alter the configuration settings of the existing user. No adjustments to their existing associated extension record are required.

## Creating an Avaya Workplace Client user

### Procedure

1. Using either IP Office Manager or IP Office Web Manager, load the system configuration.
2. If using IP Office Manager:
  - a. To edit an existing user, select the existing user record.
  - b. To add a new user, select the system on which the user record should be created and then select  User.
3. If using IP Office Web Manager:
  - a. Select **Call Management > Users**.
  - b. To edit an existing user, click the  pencil icon next to the user.
  - c. To add a new user, click **+Add User** and select the system on which the user record should be created.

4. Configure the user settings.

## Avaya Workplace Client Emergency Number Dialing

You must instruct Avaya Workplace Client users on mobile/cellular devices to use the device's native dialer application when connecting from a remote location. Doing otherwise associates the emergency call with the IP Office location rather than the mobile/cellular device user's true location.

### Using Cellular Direct Numbers for Emergency Calls

For Avaya Workplace Client users on mobile iOS/Android devices, you can configure a set of "cellular direct numbers" (CDN).

When an Avaya Workplace Client user dials a cellular direct number, the client prompts the user to allow the device's native dialer direct to make the call using the mobile/cellular public telephone network. The call location information is then determined by the mobile/cellular network provider's own services.

### The SET\_CDNL Source Number

For IP Office R11.1 FP2 SP2 and higher, you can use the **NoUser** source number SET\_CDNL= to add cellular direct number settings to the IP Office system's configuration. These settings add CDN commands to the auto-generated 46xxsettings.txt file.

- SET\_CDNL=DISABLED

This adds the following string to the auto-generated `46xxsettings.txt` file. This disables cellular direct number operation.

```
- SET CELLULAR_DIRECT_ENABLED 0
```

- `SET_CDNL="911", "9911"`

This adds the following strings to the auto-generated `46xxsettings.txt` file. These enable cellular direct number operation and specify the numbers that will trigger the feature. Enclose each number in " " quotation marks. Separate multiple numbers with commas.

```
- SET CELLULAR_DIRECT_ENABLED 1
  SET CELLULAR_DIRECT_NUMBER_LIST "911", "9911"
```

- You can use multiple `SET_CDNL=` source numbers.
- The maximum length of any individual `SET_CDNL=` entry is 63 characters.
- The maximum length of the `SET CELLULAR_DIRECT_NUMBER_LIST` string is 127 characters.

The key settings used for Avaya Workplace Client and functional description.

<b>Profile</b>	Avaya Workplace Client is supported for any user profile other than <b>Non-licensed User</b> and <b>Telephony User</b> .
<b>Enable Mobile VoIP client</b>	Select this option to allow the user to use Avaya Workplace Client on Android and iOS devices.
<b>Enable Desktop/ Tablet VoIP client</b>	Select this option to allow the user to use Avaya Workplace Client on macOS and Windows devices.

## IP Office Settings Files

During registration, the Avaya Workplace Client requests a `46xxsettings.txt` file from the IP Office system. This contains a range of settings that control how the client will operate. This is either an `46xxsettings.txt` file auto-generated by the IP Office system when requested or a static file that you have uploaded to the IP Office.

Using the auto-generated file is recommended as its contents automatically change to match the configuration of the IP Office system.

You can change or override the contents of the auto-generated `46xxsettings.txt` file when required:

- **NoUser Source Numbers**

You can add special values to the IP Office system configuration as **NoUser** source numbers. These add additional values to the `46xxsettings.txt` file. See [Avaya Workplace Client NoUser Source Numbers](#) on page 22.

- **46xxspecials.txt File**

For IP Office R11.1.2.4 and higher, the IP Office supports using a `46xxspecials.txt` with Avaya Workplace Client. When present on the IP Office system, after requesting the `46xxsettings.txt` file the client will request the `46xxspecials.txt` file. This allows you to add additional settings whilst still using the auto-generated `46xxspecials.txt` file.

## Avaya Workplace Client NoUser Source Numbers

The values in the auto-generated `46xxsettings.txt` settings file are based on settings taken from the IP Office system configuration. However, it may occasionally be necessary to add additional values to the auto-generated file. You can do this by entering the values into the IP Office configuration as **NoUser** source numbers.

- Since these changes are applied to the values in the auto-generated `46xxsettings.txt` file, they are overridden by any setting entered in the `46xxspecials.txt` file if present.
- There are a number of **NoUser** source number settings used for remote extensions. They operate differently in that they change existing values in the auto-generated settings file given to a phone when the system detects that the phone requesting the file is a remote extension. See the [Deploying Remote IP Office SIP Phones with an ASBCE](#) manual.

Example **NoUser** source numbers for Avaya Workplace Client are:

- `EQNX_CONTACT_MATCHING_MIN_DIGITS=N`

By default the Avaya Workplace Client performs contact matching on calls using 10-digits. For some locations national numbering is shorter, for example 8 digits in Bahrain. This **NoUser** source numbers adds the command `SET CONTACT_MATCHING_MIN_DIGITS N` to the auto-generated `46xxsettings.txt`, where `N` is the number of digits to use for contact matching.

- `SET_CDNL=DISABLED`

This adds the following string to the auto-generated `46xxsettings.txt` file. This disables cellular direct number operation.

```
- SET CELLULAR_DIRECT_ENABLED 0
```

- `SET_CDNL="911", "9911"`

This adds the following strings to the auto-generated `46xxsettings.txt` file. These enable cellular direct number operation and specify the numbers that will trigger the feature. Enclose each number in " " quotation marks. Separate multiple numbers with commas.

```
- SET CELLULAR_DIRECT_ENABLED 1
  SET CELLULAR_DIRECT_NUMBER_LIST "911", "9911"
```

- You can use multiple `SET_CDNL=` source numbers.
- The maximum length of any individual `SET_CDNL=` entry is 63 characters.
- The maximum length of the `SET CELLULAR_DIRECT_NUMBER_LIST` string is 127 characters.

- Microsoft .NET Framework 4.5.2 or a later version.
- Exchange Server/Outlook Integration
  - Exchange Server 2013 and later.
  - Microsoft Outlook add-in for web mail is supported on Exchange Server 2013 and later.
  - Exchange Web Services must be enabled for the Avaya Workplace Client Outlook Add-in. Internet access must also be available because portions of the add-in are hosted on the Internet.

4. Accept the terms of the license agreement and click **Next**.
5. Select the type of installation and click **Next**.

The **Custom** option allows you to select not to install the Outlook and web browser options.

6. If necessary change the installation path. Click **Next**.
7. Select the default language and click **Next**.
8. Click **Install**.
9. If prompted by the Windows operating system whether to allow the installation select **Yes**.
10. Click **Finish**.

## Windows command line installation

The following command line options can be used to install/uninstall the Windows client. These can be used for individual installations or by network administrators to create group policies for installation (see [Installation using a group policy](#) on page 27).

- The Windows command is `msiexec`. This is then followed by a number of command options and values those options.
- - Several options require the name of the Avaya Workplace Client installation file. Enclose the file name in "" quotation marks. The file name varies depending on the version. For example: "Avaya Workplace Setup 3.20.1.10.2.msi"
- Multiple command options can be combined. For example, `msiexec /i "Avaya Workplace Setup 3.20.1.10.2.msi" /qn OP=0` specifies an installation with no display (silent install) and the Outlook plug install disabled.

5. Place the Avaya Workplace Client installer into the the **Scripts/Startup** folder.

You can open the location by clicking **Show Files**.

6. Add a new script by clicking **Add**.
7. Browse for the Avaya Workplace Client installer.
8. In the **Script Parameters** field, add the command line parameters required.

For example, for a silent installation add the **/qn** parameter and click **OK**

# Chapter 5: Initial Avaya Workplace Client configuration

The details that the user needs to enter during the initial login vary depending on whether the installation model is using Avaya Spaces or not:

Method	Description
<b>Email Login/Login with Avaya Spaces:</b>	This login uses the user's domain email address as configured in the Avaya Spaces settings. Those settings then connect the client with the IP Office system.
<b>IP Office Login/Login without Avaya Spaces:</b>	This login uses the direct address of the settings file on the IP Office system and then uses the IP Office user's extension number and password.

# Chapter 8: Workplace Shared Control Mode

Windows and macOS users can switch their Avaya Workplace Client to shared control mode. In this mode, the client is used to make and answer calls via the user's associated desk phone.

- Supported phones: 1100 Series, 1200 Series, J100 Series (except J129), 9600 Series, DECT R4, digital and analog extensions.
- The Avaya Workplace Client can control the following telephony features on the phone: answer calls, make calls, hold, unhold, ignore, drop, transfer, conference, send DTMF, collect voicemail.
- This feature is not supported for users licensed for 'basic' features only.

When using shared control mode, the following changes apply to the Avaya Workplace Client:

- Mute/unmute is not supported. The clients mute/unmute controls are disabled.
- Video calls are not supported. The video call controls are disabled.
- Conference controls are hidden.
- The user cannot drag multiple contacts in order to create an ad-hoc conference.
- The user cannot add someone to a call.
- Numbers dialed from the client are not processed by the client's dial plan settings.
- Calls ignored on the desk phone (which mutes the phones audible alerting) continue to audible alert on the client.
- Exiting the client/logging in again does not affect existing calls in progress on the desk phone.

## Simultaneous Mode Notes

The following notes relate to the operation of simultaneous telephony:

- Incoming calls to the user alert on all their devices and they can choose which device they want to use to answer.

- Whilst the user has a call in progress on one of the devices, any additional incoming call is presented only to that device.
- It is recommended not to mix simultaneous mode operation with features such as mobile twinning, telecommuting and mobile call controls that can lead to multiple duplicate calls. For example, a mobile client's external PSTN numbers as a active mobile twinning destination will cause duplicate alerts for the same call.
- Users can have their desk phone and their softphone applications registered to different servers in an IP Office network.
- Use of simultaneous mode is not supported when also using a non-telephony CTI client to control call handling. In that scenario it is not always possible to predict which telephony client will be used when making/answering a call from the CTI client which can lead to confusion.

<b>Workplace Clients</b>	<p>For IP Office R11.1.3 and higher, Avaya Workplace Client users can use their client to move and retrieve calls:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Using move, the user can send a call from their Avaya Workplace Client to their other simultaneous devices.</li> <li>• Using retrieve, the user can move a call answered on their simultaneous device to their Avaya Workplace Client.</li> </ul> <p>These features are enabled by a <code>SET IPO_CALL_HANDBOVER_ENABLED 1</code> line in the <code>46xxsettings.txt</code> file.</p>

# Chapter 10: Avaya Workplace Client VDI Support

In basic outline, the solution uses two clients.

- One installed on the user's virtual desktop and used for call control.
- The other installed on the local PC from which the user accesses their virtual desktop. This client is used purely for the call media of calls controlled by the client running on the virtual desktop.
- The user needs to be logged in on both clients at the same time.
- This is supported for **Power User** and **Unified Communications User** user profiles.

The basic command line used command is `msiexec /i "Avaya Workplace Setup.msi" VDIENV=1`. This runs the installation whilst enabling settings for use in a virtual desktop environment. The file name will be similar to the following: Logs\_2022-12-19\_10-19-36-270.zip.

## Verifying the company domain

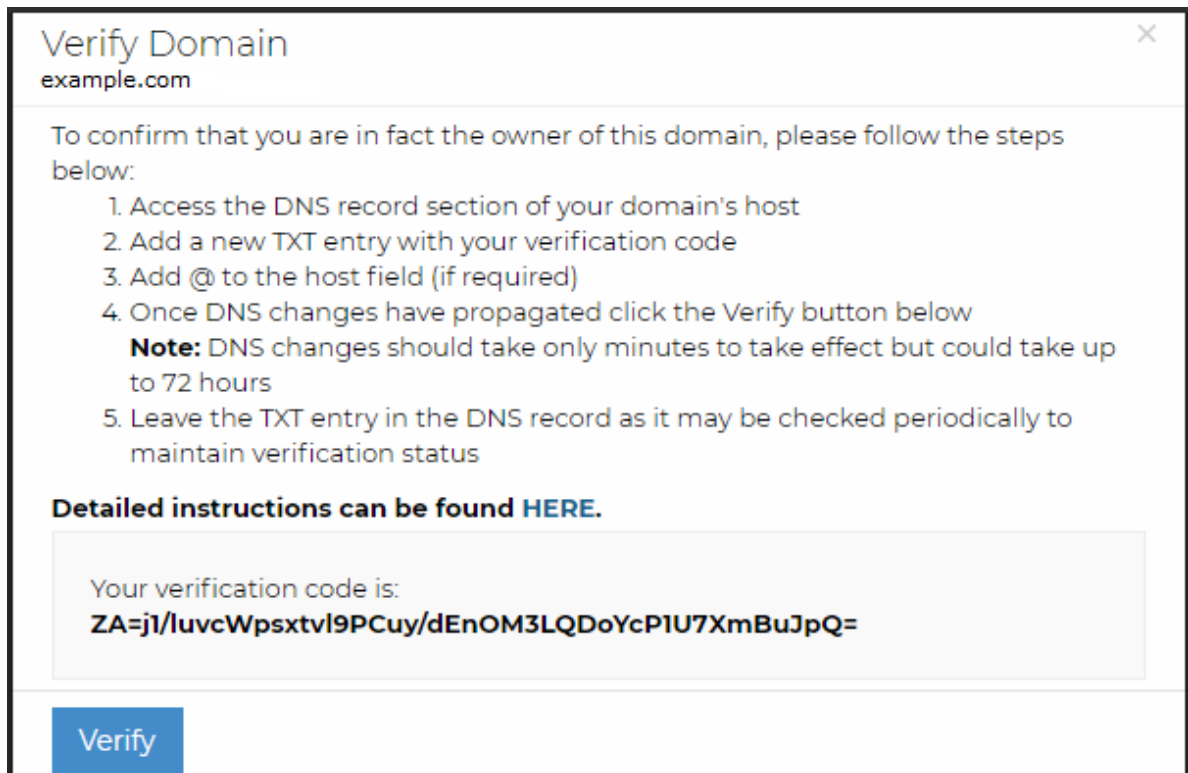
The key part of Avaya Cloud Services integration is to associate the customer's domain address with their Avaya Cloud Services account. This process requires:

- The customer domain. For example: `example.com`
- Access to the DNS server settings for the domain.

### Procedure

2. If not already done so, click on your name top-right and select **Add Company**. Otherwise, click on **Manage Companies** and then either:
  - Click on the existing company name.

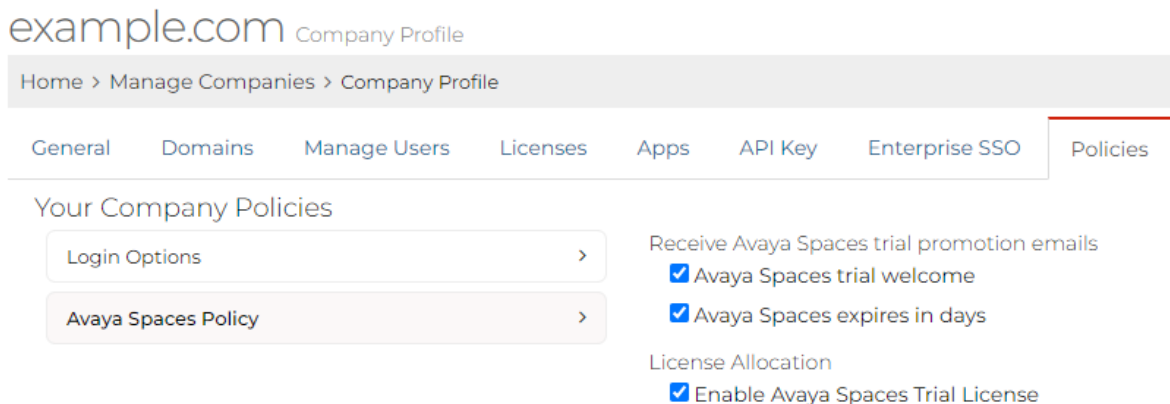

# Chapter 15: Enabling Apple Push Notifications

The IP Office can use Apple Push Notification Service (APNS) to send push notifications to Avaya Workplace Client users on iOS devices. If iOS has suspended the client, the user can use controls in the notification to restart the client.

- The IP Office will send push notifications for new calls and for new voicemail messages.
- If using the Avaya one-X Portal as its messaging server, the IP Office will also send push notifications for instant messages.

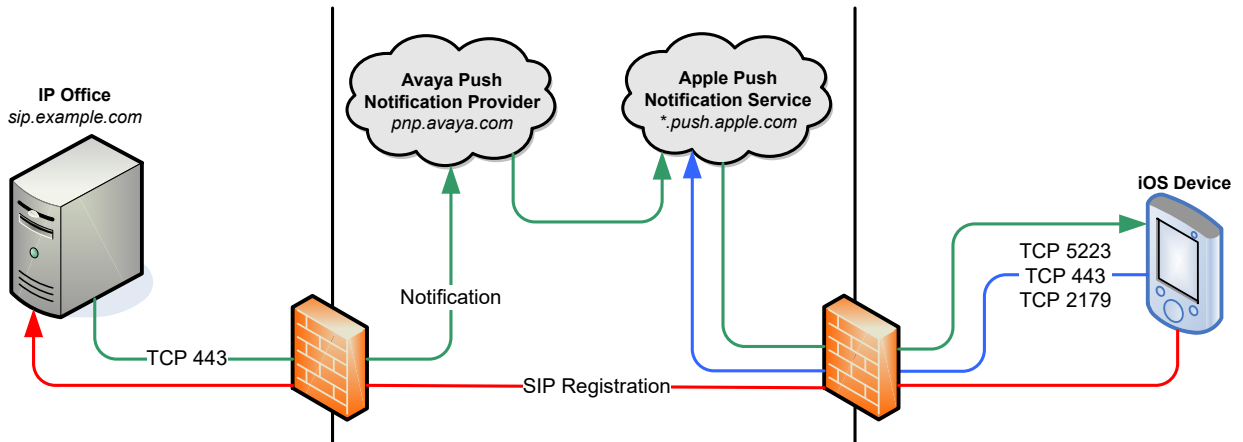

## Push notification routing

The following diagram summarizes the connections involved in Apple push notifications.

## Enabling Apple Push Notifications



- The IP Office sends push notifications to the Avaya Push Notification Provider (PNP) at `pnp.avaya.com`. It does that using HTTPS and port 443. For scenarios with an ASBCE, the push notifications are not routed through the ASBCE.
- Avaya PNP forwards the push notifications to the Apple Push Notification Service (APNS) at `*.push.apple.com`.
- APNS forward the push notifications to the iOS devices.
- Call details in the push notifications are encrypted end-to-end.

### iOS device ports

To support push notifications, the iOS devices must have outgoing access to the following ports and internet addresses.

## Push notification notes

- IP Office R11.1 and higher supports push notifications with Avaya Workplace Client 3.06 and higher on iOS.
- iOS automatically suspends the Avaya Workplace Client after 3 minutes of inactivity. Users can manually suspend Avaya Workplace Client by putting the application into the background.
- Push notifications do not require the IP Office user to have a **Unique Identity** synchronized with Avaya Spaces.
- The IP Office sends push notification to the last iOS device register by a user.
- It can take several seconds to receive a call push notification, restart the suspended client and answer the call. Therefore, Avaya recommend the following changes to IP Office user settings:
  - Increase the user's **No Answer Time** to at least 20 seconds.
  - If the user is a member of any hunt group, increase the group's **Group No Answer Time**.
  - Ensure that the user has an alternate call coverage destination for their **No Answer Time** expiring. For example; voicemail enabled or a forward on no answer number destination.
  - If the user sets the cellular telephone number of their iOS device as their **Mobile Twinning** destination, set their **Mobile Dial Delay** (sec) to at least 10 seconds. This allows time to answer the push notification using a suspended client before the same call then alerts as a cellular call.
- China does not support the iOS CallKit API used for push notifications. In that locale, call notifications do not provide call controls. However, when clicked they will display a menu to answer or decline the call.
- The IP Office does not send push notifications for instant messages.
- The Avaya Workplace Client setting `VOIPCALLINGENABLED` must be set to 1 (prefer Wi-Fi) or 3 (prefer cellular). Using any other value causes incoming calls that the user cannot answer.

  - Enabling this setting causes the IP Office to generate a hidden **System-ID** value. Servers in a multi-site network (non-SCN) must all use the same **System-ID** value. You can ensure that using the **Actions > Synchronize APNS configuration** command and then the **Actions > Synchronize APNP System-ID** command after configuring the primary server.
5. The other settings are for information only. You cannot change them.
6. Click **Update**.

### About this task

It can take several seconds to receive a call push notification, restart the suspended client and answer the call. Therefore, Avaya recommend the following changes to IP Office user settings:

1. Login to the IP Office to edit the configuration settings.
2. Make the following configuration changes:
  - Increase the user's **No Answer Time** to at least 20 seconds.
  - If the user is a member of any hunt group, increase the group's **Group No Answer Time**.
  - Ensure that the user has an alternate call coverage destination for their **No Answer Time** expiring. For example; voicemail enabled or a forward on no answer number destination.
  - If the user sets the cellular telephone number of their iOS device as their **Mobile Twinning** destination, set their **Mobile Dial Delay** (sec) to at least 10 seconds. This allows time to answer the push notification using a suspended client before the same call then alerts as a cellular call.

## Updating the Avaya Workplace clients

Enabling **Enable Apple Push Notification Services** changes the contents of the auto-generated `46xxsettings.txt` file provided by the IP Office system.

- To apply the new settings to existing Avaya Workplace Client applications:
  - By default, the clients regularly update using the `SETTINGS_CHECK_INTERVAL` setting. The IP Office auto-generated `46xxsettings.txt` file uses the default of 1 day.
  - Otherwise, to force an update:
    - **For desktop clients:** Click the  icon and select **Support**. Then click **Check for Updates**.
    - **For mobile clients:** Click the  icon and select **Exit**. Then restart the application.

## Settings file change details

Enabling **Enable Apple Push Notification Services** makes the following changes to the auto-generated `46xxsettings.txt` file:

- The `SET PUSH_NOTIFICATION_ENABLED 0` string changes to `SET PUSH_NOTIFICATION_ENABLED 1`.
- The IP Office adds a `SET TELEPHONY_PUSH_NOTIFICATION_SERVICE_URL` string using the IP Office system's **SIP Registrar FQDN** value. For example:
  - `SET TELEPHONY_PUSH_NOTIFICATION_SERVICE_URL "https://sip.example.com:443/PushNotification`
  - The port used changes to 411 if **Use Preferred Phone Ports** is enabled.

## Spaces Calling Limitations

The following known limitations apply for Spaces Calling operation in conjunction with IP Office:

- The directory shown for the Chrome extension is local to the Chrome extension. It does not include the IP Office user and system directory entries.
- The call log shown for the Chrome extension is local to the Chrome extension. It does not include the user's calls made with other IP Office devices.
- The Chrome extension directory only shows and allows calls to IP Office users with a **Unique Identity**. Therefore, Avaya recommended you configure a **Unique Identity** for all IP Office users. That gives all users a free basic account unless specifically licensed for other features.
- The Avaya Workplace Client and Avaya Spaces user presence values do not match.

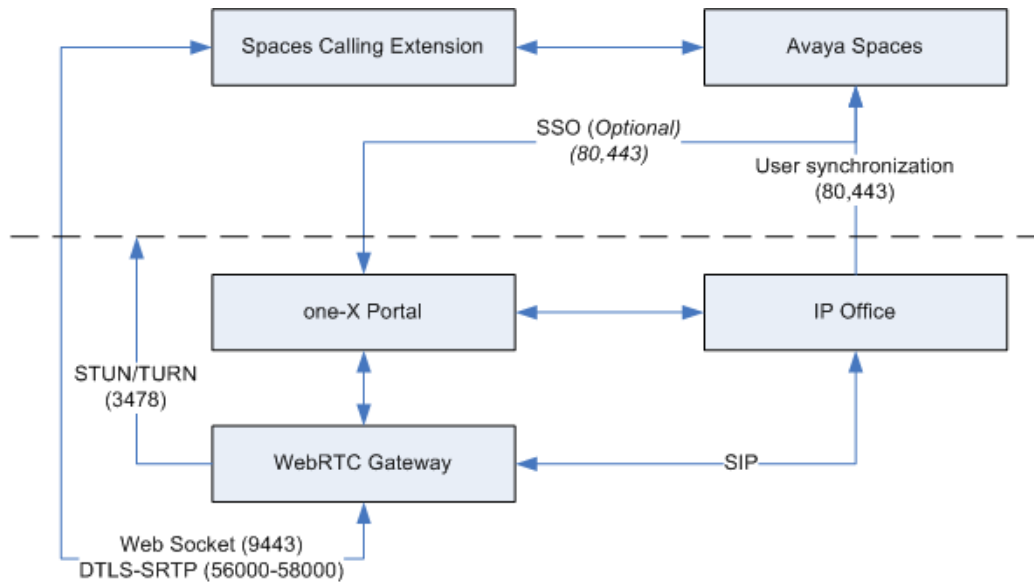

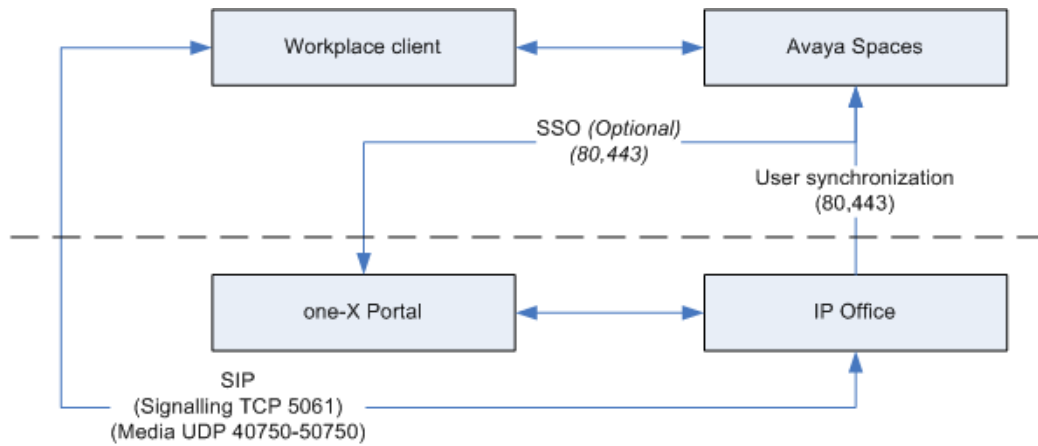

The following is a simple schematic of the connections when using a Workplace client for calls.



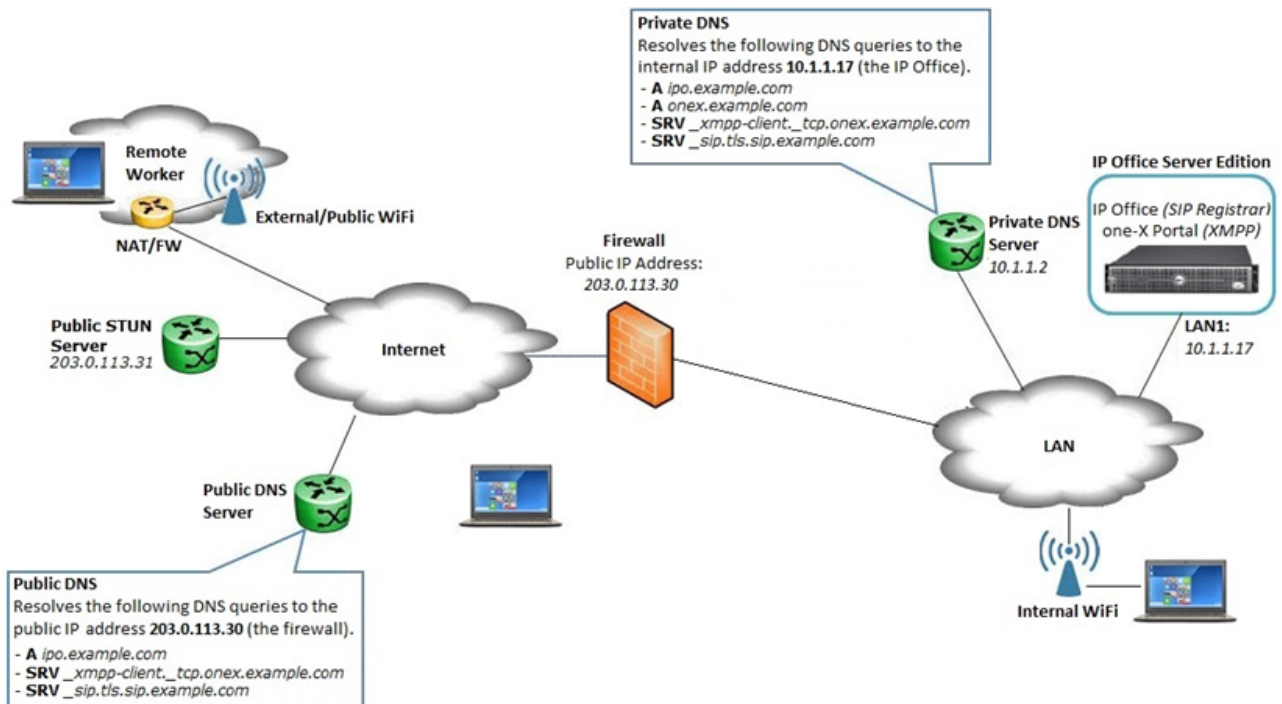

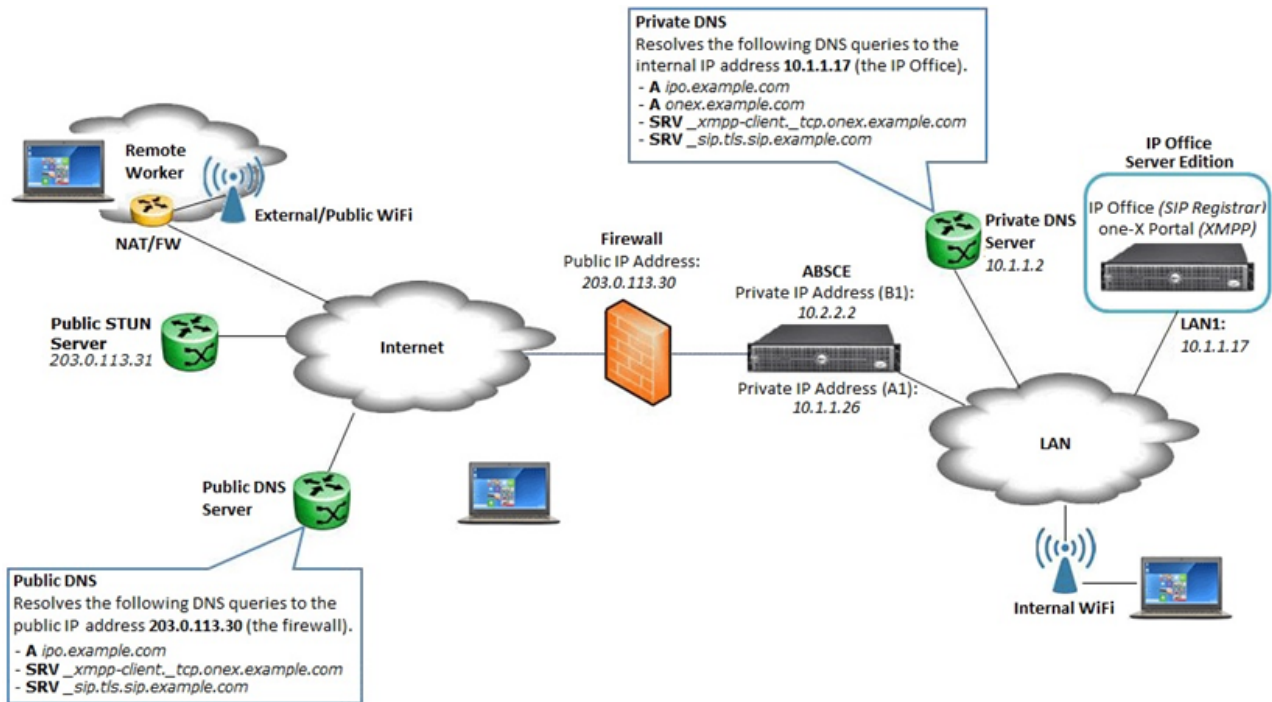

## Spaces Calling Remote Worker Using an ASBCE

You must configure the enterprise firewall to:

- Allow Layer 3 NAT only.
- Disable all SIP aware functionality such as ALG.
- Forward the TCP signaling ports (by default 9443) to IP Office Server Edition.
- Forward the RTP ports (by default 56000 to 58000) to IP Office Server Edition.

You must configure the ASBCE with:

- An application relay for connections to port 9443 on the portal server.
- STUN and TURN for media relay and NAT resolution to the WebRTC Gateway service



You must configure the WebRTC Gateway with:

- TURN support using the ASBCE for Media Relay.
- Public FQDN/IP Address of the firewall address as **STUNHost**. WebRTC Clients without **STUNHost** configuration initialize using this address.

Configure split DNS entries for the ASBCE FQDN. For the **STUNHost**, the address must resolve to:

- **Public DNS:** The public FQDN/IP address of the enterprise firewall which routes to the external interface of the ASBCE.
- **Private DNS:** The internal interface of the ASBCE.

## Manually Importing Multiple Users to Avaya Cloud Services

If not using automatic synchronization, you can add multiple users by uploading their details as a CSV format text file. After importing the file, Avaya Spaces sends each user an email inviting them to register.

- Using the import tools, you can specify which characters you used as a value separator and which characters you used to surround quoted values. In addition, you can use CSV files with different levels of content.
- The minimum content is a list of user email addresses within the verified domain. However, you can include additional data which Avaya Spaces will use to pre-populate the user information. The following are example header rows:

Simple CSV Example	email user1@example.com user2@example.com
Complex CSV Example:	email,firstname,lastname,workphone user1@example.com,teressa,green,123456 user2@example.com,bob,white,654321

The following fields can appear in the header row, with matching data for each user in the following rows. The only required header field is email:

- email - The user's email address (unique identity).
- firstname
- lastname
- middlename
- workphone
- homephone
- cellphone
- language - The user's preferred language using the two-character language and country pairing. For example: en-UK or en-US.
- address
- city
- region
- postal
- country

This process can only be performed once the domain has been verified (see [Verifying the company domain](#) on page 52) and IP Office details added (see [Adding the IP Office system details](#) on page 90).

### Procedure

1. Login to Avaya Cloud Services at <https://accounts.avayacloud.com>.
2. Click on **Manage Companies** and click on the existing company name.
3. Select the **Manage Users** tab.
4. Click **Tools** and select **Import From CSV**.
5. Click **Import From CSV**.
6. Select the settings for separator and quoted value characters that match your CSV file format.
7. Click on **Choose file** and select your CSV file.

# Chapter 18: The IP Office Settings Files

The following pages show examples of the IP Office auto-generated files used for SIP extensions, including Avaya Workplace Client.

- You can view an IP Office system's files by entering `https://` followed by the system address, then `/`, and then the file name. For example: `https://192.168.0.42/46xxsettings.txt`
  - Note: Viewing the files in a browser is not supported if the IP Office system has **System > System > Avaya HTTP Clients Only** enabled.
- You can view both auto-generated and static files using the method above.
- Auto-generated files are ephemeral. The IP Office creates the file when requested and deletes it after delivery.
- The existence of a static file overrides creating of an auto-generated file of the same name.
  - For the `46xxsettings.txt` file, Avaya strongly recommend that you let the IP Office auto-generate the file. Avaya recommend that you put any custom settings in a `46xxspecials.txt` file.
- For IP Office operation, Avaya only supports settings listed as supported by IP Office and by the phone/client with which you are using the setting.

## How the phones/clients use the settings:

- If a setting is not included in the settings files, the phones or clients assumes the default value.
- If a setting is included in the settings files, the IP phone/client applies the setting if supported.
- If a previously sent setting is removed from subsequent settings files:
  - Phones return to assuming the setting's default value.
  - Clients continue using the previously received setting value. To default settings values used by clients, you must send a settings file containing either the specific default value or " " as an empty value.

## Workplace 46xxsettings.txt file settings

Below is an example auto-generated 46xxsettings.txt file from a IP Office R11.1.3 system. The sections not relevant to Avaya Workplace Client have been removed.

- The sections labeled **AUTOGENERATEDSETTINGS** contain settings that have values that have been automatically adjusted to match the IP Office system's configuration settings. For example:
  - Addresses with ports 80 and 443, are changed to ports 8411 and 411 respectively when the IP Office **User Preferred Phone Ports** setting is enabled.
- The sections after the **NONAUTOGENERATEDSETTINGS** label contain settings which for IP Office operation have set values.
- The \$MODEL4 model values relate to the different versions of Avaya Workplace Client:
  - aca = Android mobile client.
  - aci = iOS mobile client.
  - acm = macOS desktop client.
  - acw = Windows desktop client.

## User Agent spoofing

The IP Office can vary the content of the auto-generated settings files based on the *User Agent (UA)* string of the device that requests the files. Therefore, viewing the files using a browser may not show the file exactly as received by a particular phone or application.

However, it is possible to configure a browser to temporarily use a different *UA* string. This is called *UA spoofing*.

### Example User Agent strings

- Goggle Chrome send a *UA* string like *Mozilla/5.0 (Windows NT 10.0; WOW64) AppleWebKit/537.36 (KHTML, like Gecko) Chrome/120.0.0.0 Safari/537.36*.
- The following are example *UA* strings sent by Avaya clients.

Regular Expression	Description
Avaya.*	Matches any <i>UA</i> beginning with <i>Avaya</i> . The <i>.</i> matches any character. The <i>.*</i> matches any number of characters.
Avaya J1.*	Matches the <i>UA</i> string of any J100 Series phone.
Avaya (J1 Communicator).*	Matches the <i>UA</i> string of both J100 Series phones and Avaya Workplace clients. The <i>()</i> brackets enclose the potential matches, each potential match separated by a <i> </i> character.

- As shown in the examples above, the *UA* string can vary depending on the software version and/or platform.
- You can view the *UA* sent by a particular phone or softphone in SysMonitor by registering the phone or client.

1. Using the browser, request a file from the IP Office.
2. Right-click on the window and select Inspect. The browser displays an inspection panel.
3. Click on the three-dots settings icon in the inspection panel.
4. Select **More tools** and then **Network conditions**.

5. In the **User agent** section, disable **Use browser default**.
6. In the drop-down list, select **Custom....**
7. In the text box below **Custom....**, enter the *UA* string the browser should use.
8. Refresh the browser page. The page is fetched from the IP Office using the custom *UA*.
